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Mission

Kitchen on the Street stands with children in need at the intersection of nutrition and academic excellence.

By partnering with Title 1 schools, providing weekend nutrition to food insecure children reading skills improve by 12% and math scores increase by 26%; D performing schools become B+ performing schools!

Kitchen on the Street programs that support the mission include:

Bags of Hope provide weekend nutrition, to include 1 family meals as well as individually portioned, shelf stable meals and snacks. Food insecure children pick up a Bag of Hope at school on Friday, carry it home and eat it over the weekend.

Family Food Pantries on school campuses allow struggling families to donate their time in the pantry in exchange for food. The give and get environment allows for families in food insecure households to receive food in a dignified manner and allows relationships to be established that generally lead to a deeper understanding and knowledge of the needs in the community and resources available.

Food Rescue is the practice of safely retrieving edible food that would otherwise go to waste and reintroducing it into the community.

President's Message

Dear Board of Directors:

During the 2020-2021 fiscal year your time and talent and that of faithful volunteers made it possible for Kitchen on the Street to truly impact the community, where there was despair, we have replaced it with hope and opportunity. The results for this fiscal year are as follows:

- Distributed 53,005 Bags of Hope to the 2,000 students enrolled in the program; to include 530,050 meals.
- Provided 695 Emergency Food Boxes from Family Food Pantries on school campuses to address crises food insecurity.
- Operated a food rescue program, totaling 8,823 pounds of food.
- 695 volunteers donated 1,339 hours serving the hungry and hurting of our community.
- Facilitated a Junior Board to allow young people passionate about food insecurity to develop skills to alleviate this social injustice.

While this fiscal year presented unprecedented circumstances, so many were so blessed by the creativity and faithfulness of the Board of Directors and volunteers in carrying out the mission despite the challenges. When I look back at the events of the last year, I am reminded of Deuteronomy 5:32-32 "You shall walk in all the ways which the LORD your God hath commanded you, that you may live, and that it may be well with you, and that you may prolong your days."


Thank you to all that followed God's command and continued to serve our neighbors in need and the least of these of our community.


Food secure is defined as "households that had access, at all times, to enough food for an active, healthy life for all household members".

89.5% of U.S. households were food secure in 2020!

Food insecure is

defined as "at times during the year, these households were uncertain of having, or unable to acquire, enough food to meet the requirements of the household members".

Impact

Kitchen on the Street has been serving the community since 2007, providing Bags of Hope that include weekend nutrition and Emergency Food Boxes through Family Food Pantries on school campuses.

This year 530,050 meals were distributed to food insecure children through the Bags of Hope program and 695 Emergency Food Boxes were provided via the Family Food Pantries operated on elementary school and college campuses.

Food is the largest source of waste in US landfills; this year Kitchen on the Street rescued 8,823 pounds of food; providing it to people that lack sufficient access to healthy, affordable foods.


Financials
